Renowned trio marks end of King's Lynn Festival's musical year

Britain's leading flute, cello and piano ensemble will conclude King's Lynn Festival's very successful year-round series of morning coffee concerts staged in the Town Hall.

On Friday December 2 the all-female Marsyas Trio will bring drama, elegance and vitality to the concert platform with a programme of great variety – opening with a delightful Piano Trio by Haydn.

Czerny's *Fantasia Concertante* encompasses the entirety of human emotion, and the concert will conclude with Mendelssohn's effortless perfection in his Trio in D Minor. Coffee is served prior to the 11am concert for which seating is unreserved.

Festival chairman, Alison Croose said: "Morning coffee concerts are a very popular feature of Lynn Festival events all year-round. The hour-long concerts, preceded by coffee and cake, are staged at King's Lynn Town Hall. Many of the events are presented by rising stars of the classical music world, and others performed by established musicians including soloists, duos and quartets playing a broad spectrum of classical music."

Five morning coffee concerts will be a feature of the 2023 festival which will be staged on July 16-29. Details will be announced early in the New Year.
